

**Training Module
Human Services**

- HS 101, HS 102 and HS 103 are prerequisites for HS 104 and HS 250
- Students may take HS 101 and HS 102 concurrently in the fall semester and HS 103, HS 104 concurrently in the spring semester
- Technical electives beginning with HS or SW prefixes do not have prerequisites but it is recommended that students complete HS 101 and HS 102 prior to taking a HS or SW technical elective
- HS 250 is a student practicum class. Students are required to have a criminal background check, TB skin test, student liability insurance, confidentiality agreement, and HIPPA training
- HS 250 student practicum students must complete 180 hours in a human service agency and attend one hour of lecture per week.
